Latin American (50 percent) Catholic Communications (50 percent)	January 26, 2025 January 25, 2026 January 24, 2027	<p>4<sup>th</sup> Sunday in January:</p> <p>The Collection for the <b>Church in Latin America</b> supports pastoral programs as awarded by the Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. Projects include the work of evangelization, formation of laity, religious and seminarians, as well as youth ministry and catechesis. Funding is limited to programmatic expenses and excludes building construction except in cases of emergency.</p> <p>The essential mission of <b>the Catholic Communication Campaign</b> is to contribute to the process of evangelization by fostering activities in relation to television, radio, internet, and other media, and through special projects of the Catholic press. An annual collection is taken up in the dioceses, which remit 50% of the funds collected to the National Office. From these funds, grants are made by the USCCB Subcommittee on the Catholic Communication Campaign. The remaining portion of the collection is retained by the dioceses for use in local communication projects.</p>
Church in Central and Eastern Europe	March 5, 2025 February 18, 2026 February 10, 2027	<p>Ash Wednesday:</p> <p>This collection provides aid by the Subcommittee on Aid to the <b>Church in Central and Eastern Europe</b> through bishops' conferences of Central and Eastern Europe and the ex-Soviet Union to meet the needs of rebuilding the Church. It focuses on training seminarians and lay leaders, supporting social service programs, youth ministry, pastoral and catechetical centers, schools, church construction and renovation, and evangelization through Catholic media.</p>
Rice Bowl (Catholic Charities)	During Lent	<p>During Lent:</p> <p>Not a parish collection but a Lenten program run in schools and parishes. <b>CRS Rice Bowl</b> provides funding for Catholic Relief Services' food security projects, which support agriculture, nutrition, education, and self-sufficiency in communities around the world. 75% is remitted to CRS for overseas projects and 25% may be retained in the diocese for local antipoverty programs.</p>

Catholic Relief Services	March 30, 2025 March 15, 2026 March 7, 2027	<p>4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent:</p> <p>This collection provides funding for <b>Catholic Relief Services</b>; the USCCB Offices of International Justice and Peace, Migration and Refugee Services, and Pastoral Care for Migrants and Refugees; relief work of the Holy Father; and the Catholic Legal Immigration Network.</p>
Holy Land	Good Friday April 18, 2025 April 5, 2026 March 26, 2027	<p>Good Friday:</p> <p><b>Pontifical Collection.</b> Collect funds for support of the Holy Places, but above all for those pastoral, charitable, educational and social works, which the Church supports in the <b>Holy Land</b> for the welfare of their Christian brethren and of the local communities.</p>
Catholic Charities	Mothers' Day May 11, 2025 May 10, 2026 May 9, 2027	<p>2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in May:</p>
Peter's Pence	June 29, 2025 June 28, 2026 June 27, 2027	<p>Sunday in June closest to Feast of SS Peter and Paul on June 29:</p> <p>The <b>Peter's Pence</b> Collection fulfills two aims set by the Holy See: "(1) To support the Holy Father's mission, which extends throughout the entire world, from the proclamation of the Gospel to the promotion of integral human development, education, peace, and brotherhood among peoples: thanks also to the many activities of service carried out by the dicasteries, bodies and organs of the Holy See that assist him every day; and (2) To support the numerous charitable works in aid of people and families in difficulty, populations afflicted by natural disasters and wars, or who are in need of humanitarian assistance or support for development."</p>
Catholic Home Missions (50 percent) Black and Native American (50 percent)	August 24, 2025 August 23, 2026 August 29, 2027	<p>Last Sunday in August unless it occurs on Labor Day weekend, then will be the Sunday before:</p> <p>Launched in 1998, the Appeal strengthens the Catholic Church in the United States and its territories in 85 Latin and Eastern Catholic dioceses. The Subcommittee on the <b>Catholic Home Missions</b> funds a wide range of pastoral services, including evangelization, religious education, and the maintenance of mission parishes, the training of seminarians and lay ministers, and ministry with ethnic groups.</p> <p>Mandated by the III Plenary Council in 1884, the 140-year-old <b>National Collection for Black and Indian</b> people continues as the embodiment of the Church's concern for evangelizing the Black and Indian peoples of the United States. The funds are distributed as grants to dioceses throughout the United States, supporting and strengthening evangelization programs which otherwise would cease. The Collection was formerly known as The Black and Indian Home Mission Collection.</p>

World Mission Sunday (Propagation of the Faith)	October 19, 2025 October 18, 2026 October 24, 2027	<p>2<sup>nd</sup> to the last Sunday in October:</p> <p>In 1926 Pope Pius XI instituted <b>Mission Sunday</b> for the whole Church with the first worldwide Mission Sunday collection taking place in October 1927. The Mission Sunday collection is always taken on the next to last Sunday during the month of October. That day is celebrated in all the local Churches as the feast of catholicity and universal solidarity so Christians the world over will recognize their common responsibility with regard to the evangelization of the world.</p>
Campaign for Human Development	November 16, 2025 November 15, 2026 November 14, 2027	<p>33<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time</p> <p>The Collection for the <b>Catholic Campaign for Human Development</b> addresses the root causes of poverty in America through promotion and support of community-controlled, self-help organizations and transformative education. Grants are awarded by the Subcommittee on the Catholic Campaign for Human Development with the approval of local bishops.</p>
Retirement Fund for Religious (90 percent) Catholic University (10 percent)	December 14, 2025 December 13, 2026 December 12, 2027	<p>2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in December:</p> <p>The <b>Retirement Fund for Religious</b> (RFR) provides funding to any religious institute in the U.S. that is listed in the religious institute section of the OCD with an identifying OCD number, and that has an unfunded past service liability. It distributes direct care, planning and implementation assistance from the fund to religious institutes based on a formula and criteria approved by the conferences of major superiors and bishops. Annual appeal begun in 1988 and approved through 2017.</p> <p>Since 1903, the National Collection – the only nationwide second collection taken for higher education in the U.S. – has been a critical source of funding for <b>Catholic University</b>. Thanks to the collection, the University has been able to educate thousands of young minds in both faith and reason, while upholding the highest standards of education and conducting critical research to serve dioceses, parishes and pastors throughout our country.</p>
Collection for the Archdiocese for the Military Services	November 9, 2025  Not taken in 2026 Not taken in 2027	<p>Sunday before Veterans' Day <u>every third year</u>:</p> <p>This unique Archdiocese is faced with many challenges, including a severe shortage of Catholic priest-chaplains, a flock spread out among military installations across the world and constant transition. <b>The Archdiocese for the Military Services</b> receives no funding from the military or the government and relies on private donations to fund all pastoral programs and services. The AMS Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program is the only U.S. Vocations Program that provides priests to serve the Church and the U.S. Military. Catholic service members and their families and veterans cared for in a Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center deserve the same faith opportunities as Catholics here at home; their faith should not be part of the sacrifices they make.</p>
