### In memory of our beloved brother Rev. Harold B. Mountain



Father Harold B. Mountain, age 89, died on Sunday, November 12, 2006. Father Mountain was born on August 1, 1917, in Good Thunder, Minnesota to Edward and Ada (Bowe) Mountain. He studied Classics at St. Mary's College in Winona, MN from 1934 to 1938. He studied Philosophy at St. Paul Seminary, St. Paul, MN from 1938 to 1939 and Theology at St. Thomas Seminary, Denver, CO from 1939 to 1942. Fr. Harold Bernard Mountain was ordained a priest on May 30, 1942 at the Chapel of the Angels on the campus of St. Teresa College, Winona, MN by the Most Rev. John H. Peschges from the St. Thomas Seminary, Denver, CO.

On June 1, 1942, Fr. Mountain celebrated his First Solemn Mass at St. Joseph's Church in Good Thunder, MN. On June 6,1943, Fr. Mountain began his ministry as an associate at St. Mary's Church, Madelia, MN and St. Thomas Pro Cathedral. On September 1, 1947, he was assigned as administrator of St. Bernard, Stewartville and Sacred Heart, Hayfield and was named pastor on June 18, 1948. On June 15, 1960, he was named Diocesan Director of the Blessed Sacrament. On January 30, 1952, he was named pastor of Christ the King, Medford and Corpus Christi, Deerfield. On August 5, 1968, he was named pastor of St. Casimir's Parish, Wells and on July 1, 1977, he was appointed pastor of Immaculate Conception in St. Clair, MN. Fr. Harold Mountain retired from active priesthood on May 30, 1989.

A Mass of Christian Burial will be offered on Wednesday, November 15, 2006, at 11:00 am at St. John the Baptist Church, Mankato, MN with visitation before the Mass from 10:00 – 11:00 am. All priests of the diocese are invited to concelebrate.

Dear Father Mountain,

On Friday evening, January 28, Father John Kunz, the dean of the Mankato deanery, and I met with Father Sylvester Brown, the members of the parish pastoral and finance councils of Immaculate Conception Church, and other interested parishioners concerning the findings of our investigation with respect to financial irregularities at the parish. It was a good meeting. It is now time to move forward.

I regret the fact that during the time of your pastoral leadership you did not make a full disclosure to my predecessor or myself about the financial condition of the parish. That was a mistake which contributed largely to our present dilemma. Certainly, you did a very fine job in providing for the needs of the parishioners. The people appreciated this very much but many were embarrassed that diocesan policies were not followed.

With respect to the \$17,000 that was expended by the parish to purchase a car for your use, this action was illicit. As you know, any expenditure in excess of \$10,000 requires the proxy of the bishop. No such proxy was ever issued. The trustees felt the action was justified because you had served the parish so well. It is one thing to seek donations from parishioners to purchase a gift for a pastor or any pastoral minister. It is another to use parish funds, without approval of the bishop and without the knowledge of all the parishioners, for such an expenditure.

It would seem that you are deeply indebted to the people of Immaculate Conception Church. At this late date it would be difficult, I believe, to repay them. Perhaps you might include this \$17,000 in your will as a legacy to the parish, if you would have such assets available at the time of your death. This would certainly seem to be a fitting and not personally inconvenient way to show your appreciation and deal honestly with the people.

Please join me in praying for the people of Immaculate Conception at this time as they work to come together in making God's kingdom clearly present in their midst. I sensed a wonderful spirit among those who gathered with me on January 28. Young and old were obviously people of faith, good will and generous hearts. Thank you very much for responding to my inquiry and helping us clarify some of the misunderstandings that have occurred.

I'm writing in regard to your questions about your dental insurance coverage. The first question to ask, is whether or not your dentist is a Delta Dental dentist or not. I've enclosed a list of Mankato dentists from the Delta Directory. If he appears on this list, he is a participating dentist. If he is not on the list, ask him anyway because he may be a recent addition.

If he is a Delta provider, he is required by contact to file this claim on your behalf. Endodontics is a covered charge under Coverage B of our plan and is paid at 80% after a \$50 deductible, however, a participating dentist is limited to charges approved by Delta Dental of Minnesota. If the procedure or the charges deem to be outside the limitations, the dentist cannot charge you for it and Delta will not pay him. If your dentist is a nonparticipating dentist, you may have to file the claim yourself. In this case, I've enclosed a form for you, however, many dentists will still file the claim. The big difference is that charges not paid by the insurance plan are your responsibility and will be billed to you by the dentist.

I hope this clears up the problem.

On may of these you say that Christian Brothers paid 0, but I do not see the explanation of benefits from Christian Brothers. I'm assuming that you have sent the claims to them and are still waiting for their answer. If their explanation of benefits does not agree with my estimates, you may need to find out why. One thing could be how they apply the bills towards your deductible. That's something I may not have taken into consideration. Please look through these papers and try to make sense out of the notes I wrote you. Let me know if you have other questions.

Another thing I've noticed, is that you are very prompt in paying your share of these bills. I would recommend that you file all the insurance papers with Medicare and Christian Brothers and wait for both to make their final determination of benefits before you pay your share. I've noticed that some clinics will write off the amount that medicare doesn't pay for a variety of reasons. Either way, it's good to wait and see exactly what is going to happen. Thanks for your letter of June 29. In order for me to fully explain how Christian Brothers handled your claim, you would need to send me a copy of the explanation of benefits that were involved in these claims. There should be explanations on these forms as to why amounts were deducted and how they came down to the \$53.94. If you think of it sometime, just make copies and send them over and I'll take a look.

While I don't pretend to be an expert on Medicare benefits, there is something I've seen other priests do incorrectly that I would like to point out and maybe help you correct. Are you assigning your medicare benefits directly to the clinic and or hospital where you receive care? If not, you should. Most clinics and hospitals are registered medicare providers. This means that they must accept whatever Medicare pays as payment in full. This often means that there would be no expenses left after Medicare for which to file with other insurance. If your Medicare checks are coming payable to you, then you should contact any of your health care providers and sign an assignment form so that Medicare will pay them directly. The insurance department of these institutions should be able to help with further explanation if you need it. Also, there should be a note on your explanation of benefits forms from Medicare telling you how much you could have saved, had you filed an assignment with Medicare. If you are already doing this, please ignore the above.

I feel I should also clarify something for you that seems to be confusing. The out-of-pocket expenses in the Christian Brothers program are capped at \$1,100 per year in covered expenses. This amounts to your \$100 deductible, plus 20% of the next \$5,000 in claims. You do not have to spend this entire \$1,100 before Christian Brothers pays. They should begin paying 80% immediately after your first \$100 in covered expenses. After that point, they will pay 80% and you will 20% of the next \$5,000, and they should pay 100% over that amount. Always remember, of course, that they will deduct the amount that Medicare paid on any of these claims. I hope this is more clear, but if not, please let me know and I'll try again.

If you'd like me to look at those previous claims from Christian Brothers, please don't forget to send me a copy. Thanks again.

Dear Fr. Mountain,

I'm writing in response to your letter of June 17 regarding your health insurance through the Diocese of Winona. I apologize for not getting back to you sooner, but I was on vacation last and just saw your letter this morning.

First, I want to explain to you how the Christian Brothers medical supplement plan works. This policy guarantees you the same level of benefits that you would have had with Christian Brothers if you were not retired and on Medicare. They should have taken your total medical charges, which you indicated were \$1,572.27 and process a claim as if you did not have Medicare. Since I don't have copies of your explanation of benefits, I will assume that they would have first applied your \$100 deductible, bringing the balance down to \$1,472.27. At that point, they would pay 80% of that amount or \$1,177.82. From this amount they would subtract the amount paid by Medicare, which was \$1,004.35, leaving a balance to be paid by Christian Brothers of \$173.47. I do not know why they only paid \$53.94, but I assume there were some items on the bill that were over the usual and customary charge, or perhaps were just not covered expenses. Your explanation of benefits should give you that explanation.

Also, remember that if you have prescription drugs, which you have paid for, and which Medicare does not reimburse, these can be turned into Christian Brothers and they will be paid the same as any other claim. I've found that many people forget about this part of the benefits, so be sure you make those claims.

I appreciate your comments and suggestions that we look into other coverage. While I have talked to others and helped them file claims, no one has suggested at this point that we look into another policy. I would be anxious to hear from some of the other retired priests as to what their situations have been. I will discuss the matter here and let you know what might be done.

Of the past few months I have had some medical bills totaling \$1,572.27\$ from Mayo Cliñic, St. Mary's Hospital, Ex-Rays doctors etc. Medicare paid a total of \$1,004.35\$ Christian Brothers paid ONLY the sum of \$53.94\$.

I verified the figures with Medicare and then called the C.B.'s and was told that after the 1st \$100.00\$ deductible I am liable for the next \$1,500.00 " OUT OF POCKET" How that \$53.94\$ ever got in there I am not sure even after the explanation!!

My doctor tells me my coverage is <u>almost</u> worthless and advises I get another supplementary company like he has with Blue Cross-Blue Shield which pays 100 % after Medicare for a premium of \$800.00 a year. Maybe best I do not have coverage from the diocese..have them pay me and I get my own supplementary coverage. I am thoroughly unhappy with this coverage. Please inform. I dislike bothering you with this matter, but a number of us retired priests have discussed this situation and are anxious for your suggestion and reply.

When we discussed Continuing Education assessments a couple of weeks ago. I brought up the fact that Fr. Harold Mountain had not paid his assessment for a number of years. The Bishop had asked at that time that he be kept up to date on this type of thing so that he has a full background of the situation.

I received a note from Fr. Mountain today with his payment for health insurance which provides a missing piece to the Continuing Ed assessment puzzle. A number of years ago, Fr. Mountain opted to withdraw from our priests' health insurance plan to purchase coverage of his own, which was apparently cheaper, better coverage or both. In years following that, he tried to get back on the group but Wisconsin Life would not allow it. Fr. Schmitz tried very hard over the years to work this out without success. In 1986 when we switched insurance companies from Wisconsin Life to Travelers, this was a good opportunity to bring Fr. Mountain into the group, which I did. From his letter I received today, I find that he has been withholding Continuing Education assessments to reimburse his parish for the extra money spent on health insurance over the years, obviously blaming the diocese for the problems which he brought upon himself. He is paying the health insurance premium which he would have to do in order to continue to be covered.

It would be my intention at this time to leave the old assessments on the books and deal with it when a new pastor goes to St. Clair. If you would like anything different done, please let me know. Thanks.



Dear Father Mountain,

Sister Helen Marie is out of her office and so her assistant showed me the questions that you have about our insurance coverage. I will include the Schedule of Benefits as it appears in the booklet from Wisconsin Life and add a few words of explanation.

- 1. Hospital room coverage per day: The basic plan has a \$45 of "first-dollar" coverage for daily room and board. Beyond that the cost goes into the major medical which rooms 80% of the additional cost.
- 2. Percentage of surgery pay: Again theme is first-dollar coverage for all kinds of surgery, and this is of a limited amount; the aggragate limit of this first-dollar coverage is \$1,000. Then charges beyond the first-dollar coverage go into the major medical where again 80% is covered by the insurance.
- 3. Maximum coverage: The major medical portion covers up to \$250,000. There is a \$100 deductible once each year and then the individual is responsible for 20% of the first \$2,500 of charges that come under the major medical. So a person can be lieble to \$600 for medical bills in one year, if the medical bills are really high. Everything is pretty much covered except regular dental care, regular eye care, and routine checkups. Prescription drugs outside of the hospital are covered under the major medical, but I don't believe they are covered under the basic plan. The supplementary accident benefit will cover ambulance to and from the hospital in case of an accident, otherwise I believe the ambulance also is paid under major medical, and not in the basic plan.
- 4. Cost efter age 65: Wisconsin Life presumes that a priest over 65 will have Medicare. Then they will process our bills by figuring out what they would have paid if the person were under 65; then they will take what Medicare pays and make up the difference between the Medicare payment and what their usual coverage would be.

I hope this answers some of your questions. And I hope that you are having a good Lent and will have a blessed Easter.

Dear Father Mountain,

This is the first opportunity I have nad to write to you after the meeting and visit of last Saturday morning in St. Casimir's; as you perhaps know, Sunday was devoted to two Confirmations and a meeting with the Diocesan Board of Education and Monday to the meeting of the Senate of Priests and Confirmation here at the Cathedral.

As all of us know, misunderstandings occur very easily; the only course of action whenthis happens is to clear the air through honest and open discussion. It seemed to me, at least, that the people who did have different points of view and conflicting opinions were able to help themselves and one another by talking together. With this beginning I am confident that some constructive planning can be forthcoming; with open meetings of the advisory board, the board of education can present the budget for the coming school year and all the people of the parish who care to attend can become informed about the finances of the parish and the projected expenditures. Many pastors have found it most helpful to have the committee on finance publish a monthly balance sneet add condensed financial report; these days people ask questions and suspect the operation when fact are not presented to them on a regular and frequent basis.

Reviewing our conversation about the First Communion program add agreeing that some problems can arise in individual difficult family situations, the thought struck me that it might be possible for both approaches to be used. The parents who wish to be involved in the instruction of their children and in receiving Holy Communion with them as a family group could be encouraged to do so and at the same time a group Communion could be planned for all the children toward the end of the school year; in this way all the children would be prepared in school and some would have the special advantage of nome instruction. It seems to me that this approach might satisfy both groups.

In your recent letter you express your concern about a Sister talking on prayer in the Lutheran Church; like you I see some dangers involved. The question of what to say and do about Pentecostalism is a difficult one. At the November meeting of the bishops the recommendation was made that this movement not be crushed; rather, it should be directed by responsible people add the results should be closely watched. If good people are confused or scandalized, this should be called to the attention of the leaders of the group.

I suppose we would have to agree that it is always good to pray, especially in groups which use the Scriptures. At the same time, however, I feel we must also say that in the best interest of all concerned, plans for meetings of this kind should be discussed with the pastor; proper safeguards must also be provided so that no one might be narmed spiritually or emotionally. But this time you probably have heard reports of the first meeting in the Church in Wells; perhaps we could review your evaluation of the program and it impact on the community.

It was good to have an opportunity to visit with you and to enjoy the delicious lunch. I left with the good feeling that all of us helped each other grow in mutual understanding and that by working together both St. Casimir's School and the CCD program could continue to improve.

St. Patrick does remind us that we must use every effective means of handing on the gift of faith to our young people; may he help us with his powerful intercession, especially in this feast day of his!

Yesterday | presented the 1970-71 budget to the people of the parish.....showing the increase of over \$12,000.00 from the past year. I asked them to take a very realistic look at the financial situation as we decide what the future has in store for us. The letter I received from Msgr. Habiger told us to not look just for a year or so but for five years ahead or longer. That is what I asked them to do.

I have called a Parish Council meeting for this Wednesdaday night and an "Open Meeting" for the entire parish for next Sunday afternoon. I hope the great majority will speak up rather than the wild little group of agitators.

This Wednesday a Notre Dame Nun from Mankato is talking at the Lutheran Church to all the H.S. students in Wells on "Prayer". We were not invited. #### Profession of Faith and Oath Against Modernism

I, with a firm faith, believe and profess each and all the articles that are contained in the Nicaean Creed which is used by the Holy Roman Church. I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages; God of God, Light of Light, True God of True God; begotten, not made, of one substance with the Father, through whom all things were created. For us men and for our salvation He came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was made flesh of the Virgin Mary; and became man. He was crucified also for us, suffered under Pontius Pilate, and was buried. And on the third day He rose, according to the Scriptures, and He ascended into heaven. He is seated at the right hand of the Father. And He shall come again in glory to judge the living and the dead; of whose reign there shall be no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, Lord and giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. Who together with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified; who spoke through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic church. I confess one baptism for the remission of sins. And I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen

I admit and embrace most firmly the apostolic and ecclesiastical tradition and all the other constitutions and prescriptions of the Church.

I admit the Sacred Scriptures according to the sense which has been held and which is still held by holy Mother Church, whose duty it is to judge the true sense and interpretation of the Sacred Scriptures, and I shall never accept or interpret them except according to the unanimous consent of the Fathers.

I profess that the sacraments of the New Law are, truly and precisely seven in number, instituted by Our Lord Jesus Christ for the salvation of mankind, though all are not necessary for each individual: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Penance, Extreme Unction, Holy Orders, and Matrimony. I profess that all confer grace and that of these Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders cannot be repeated without sacrilege.

I also accept and admit the ritual of the Catholic Church in the solemn adminstration of all the above-mentioned sacraments.

I accept and hold, in each and every part, all that has been defined and declared by the Sacred Council of Trent concerning Original Sin and Justification. I profess that in the Mass is offered to God a true, real, and propiticatory sacrifice for the living and the dead; that in the Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist is really, truly, and substantially the Body and Blood together with the soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, and that there takes place what the Church calls transubstantiation, that is the change of all the substance of bread into the Body and of all substance of wine into the Blood. I confess also that in receiving under either of these species one receives Jesus Christ, whole and entire.

I firmly hold that Purgatory exists and that the souls detained there can be helped by the prayers of the faithful. Likewise I hold that the saints, who reign with Jesus Christ, should be venerated and invoked, that they offer prayers to God for us and that their relics are to be venerated.

I profess firmly that the images of Jesus Christ and of the Mother of God, ever Virgin, as well as of all the saints should be held and retained and given due honor and veneration. I also affirm that Jesus Christ left to the Church the faculty to grant Indulgences and that their use is most salutary to the Christian people. I recognize the holy Roman, Catholic, and Apostolic Church as the mother and teacher of all the Churches and I promise and swear true obedience to the Roman Pontiff, successor of St. Peter, Prince of the Apostles, and Vicar of Jesus Christ.

Besides I accept, without hesitation, and profess all that has been handed down, defined, and declared by the Sacred Canons and by the general Councils, especially by the Sacred Council of Trent and by the Vatican General Council, and in a special manner concerning the primacy and infallibility of the Roman Pontiff. At the same time I condemn and reprove all that the Church has condemned and reproved. This same Catholic faith, outside of which nobody can be saved, which I now freely profess and to which I truly adhere, the same I promise and swear to maintain and profess, with the help of God, entire, inviolate, and with firm constancy until the last breath of life; and I shall strive, as far as possible, that this same faith shall be held, taught, and publicly professed by all those who depend on me and by those of whom I shall have charge.

I therefore promise, swear and vow.

I firmly hold and accept each and every definition of the unerring teaching of the Church, with all she has maintained and declared, but especially those points of doctrine which expressly combat the errors of our time. In the first place I profess my belief that God, the beginning and end of all, can be certainly known and therefore proved to exist by the natural light of reason from the things that are made, that is, from the visible works of the creation as a cause from its effect. Next I recognize and acknowledge the external arguments of revelation, that is, divine facts, especially miracles and prophecies, as most certain signs of the divine origin of the Christian religion, and I hold that these are altogether suited to the understanding of every age and of all men, also of our times. Thirdly I likewise hold with firm faith that the Church, the guardian and exponent of the revealed Word, was proximately and directly founded by the true and historic Christ Himself, while He dwelt amongst us, and that she was also built

upon Peter, the Prince of the Apostolic Hierarchy, and upon his successors to the end of time. Fourthly, I sincerely accept the teaching of faith as transmitted down to us from the Apostles through the orthodox Fathers in the same sense and even in the same wording; and, therefore, I wholly reject the heretical notions of the evolution of dogmas, which pass from one sense to another alien to that which the Church held from the start; and I likewise condemn every error whereby is substituted for the divine deposit, entrusted by Christ to His Spouse and by Her faithfully guarded, a philosophic system or the creation of a human consciousness, gradually refined by the striving of men and finally to be perfected hereafter by indefinite progress. Fifthly, I hold for certain and sincerely profess that Fatith is not blind religious sense making its way out of the hidden regions of the sub-liminal consciousness, morally tinged by the influence of heart and will, but is a true assent of the intellect to truth received from without by hearing, an assent whereby we believe to be true, because of the authority of the all-true God, whatever by the personal God, our Creator and Lord, has been spoken, testified and revealed.

I further, with all due reverence, submit and with my whole mind adhere to all the condemnations, declarations, and ordinances contained in the Encyclical letter **Pascendi** and in the Decree **Lamentabili**, particularly regarding what is called the history of Dogma.

I also reject the error of those who aver that the Faith proposed by the Church may be in conflict with history, and that Catholic dogmas in the sense in which they are now understood cannot be harmonized with the more truthful "origins" of Christianity. Moreover, I condemn and reject the opinion which declares that a Christian man of better culture can assume a dual personality, one as a believer and another as an historian, as if it were permissible for the historian to hold fast what his faith as a believer contradicts, or to lay down premises from which there follows the falsity or the uncertainty of dogmas, provided only that these are not directly denied. Likewise I reject that method of estimating and interpreting Holy Writ, which, setting aside the Church's tradition and the analogy of Faith and the rules of the Apostolic See, adopts the rationalists' principles and with equal arbitrariness and rashness considers criticism of the text the one only supreme rule. Furthermore, I reject the opinion of those who hold that a teacher of the science of Historical Theology or the writer on the subject must first put aside the notions previously conceived about the supernatural origin of Catholic tradition or about the divine aid promised for the perpetual preservation of each revealed truth; then, that the writings of individual Fathers must be interpreted solely by the data of science, without any reference to sacred authority, and with that freedom of judgment wherewith every profane record is usually examined.

Finally and in general, I declare myself to be far removed from the error of the modernists who hold that in sacred tradition there is nothing inherently divine; or who—far worse still—admit it in a pantheistic sense; so that thus there would remain only a bare simple fact equal to the ordinary facts of history, viz., that the school started by Christ and His Apostles finds, in the ages that follow, men to carry it on by their energy, their skill, and their genius. Wherefore most firmly do I retain and to my last breath will I retain the Father of the Fathers of the Church concerning the sure endowment of truth, which is, has been, and ever will be in the succession of the Episcopate from the Apostles; not in such a way that what seems best and most fitting according to the refinement of each age may be held, but that the absolute and unchangeable truth preached from the beginning by the Apostles may never in any different wise be believed, never in any different wise be understood.

I extend congratulations and best wishes on the occasion of your seventeenth anniversary of your consecration as a bishop. I shall offer Mass tomorrow for your intention.

I wish to donate the statue of the Blessed Virgin for the Austin Hospice if it has not already been spoken for. My check will follow later this Fall as I have had unusual expense this year with hospital bills for my father who has been hospitalized much with a heart condition. He is going on seventy-eight years of age.

You mentioned doing some mortification in our last visit. I have taken the pledge over a month ago and am very happy I did so; I am back to my Holy Hour a day. We started a Mission here an Sunday and it is going very very well. The 1st afternoon a 15 year old boy was killed ina tractor accident, which startled the whole community. Maybe God's way of waking people up a bit. This man is a much better speaker than we had for our priest's retreat. The priets from the deanery and Faribault have been in every evening and I have not taken a drink and find it isn't even noticed by them.

I hope and pray that you will show to my brother the mercy and kindness that you extended to me and to many many other priets in our diocese during the years you have been our Bishop. In the book "The Priess is not His Own" there is this paragraph that stays in my mind.. "Peter sinned. He failed the Master. And yet the Son of God chose Peter, who knew sin, rather than the beloved John as the Rock upon which to build His Church, that sinners and the weak might never have excuse to despair." Again "Like Peter, every priest at one time or another gets out of step with Christ, follows behind, communes with worldly company and secular fires. Christ nevertheless treats him as he treated Peter. He constantly turns to look upon him. It was not Peter who thought pf turning, but the Lord. This is the essential point for every priest of Christ to keep in mind when he sins..the Lord turns first." I have wept often this past month for my own offenses and my brothers. You are celebrating your seven-teenth anniversary today as a Bishop. There is a priest that has observed about seventeen years in this diocese. Last week I was back to Mayo's and they find that the bone that was grafted in my foot is broken, which will necessitate surgery. I am barely able new to walk. "I . . . firmly hold and accept each and every definition of the unerring teaching of the Church, with all she has maintained and declared, but especially those points of doctrine which expressly combat the errors of our time. In the first place I profess my belief that God, the beginning and end of all, can be certainly known and therefore proved to exist by the natural light of reason from the things that are made, that is, from the visible works of the creation as a cause from its effect. Next I recognize and acknowledge the external arguments of revelation, that is, divine facts, especially miracles and prophecies, as most certain signs of the divine origin of the Christian religion, and I hold that these are altogether suited to the understanding of every age and of all men, also of our times. Thirdly, I likewise hold with firm faith that the Church, the guardian and exponent of the revealed Word, was proximately and directly founded by the true and historic Christ Himself, while He dwelt amongst us, and that she was also built upon Peter, the Prince of the Apostolic Hierarchy, and upon his successors to the end of time. Fourthly, I sincerely accept the teaching of faith as transmitted down to us from the Apostles through the orthodox Fathers in the same sense and even in the same wording; and, therefore, I wholly reject the heretical notions of the evolution of dogmas, which pass from one sense to another alien to that which the Church held from the start; and I likewise condemn every error whereby is substituted for the divine deposit, entrusted by Christ to His Spouse and by Her to be faithfully guarded, a philosophic system or the creation of a human consciousness, gradually refined by the striving of men and finally to be perfected hereafter by indefinite progress. Fifthly, I hold for certain and sincerely profess that Faith is not a blind religious sense making its way out of the hidden regions of the sub-liminal consciousness, morally tinged by the influence of heart and will, but is a true assent of the intellect to truth received from without by hearing, an assent whereby we believe to be true, because of the authority of the all-true God, whatever by the personal God, our Creator and Lord, has been spoken, testified and revealed.

"I further, with all due reverence, submit and with my whole mind adhere to all the con-

In universum denique me alienissimum ab errore profiteor, quo modernistae tenent in sacra traditione nihil inesse divini; aut, quod longe deterius, pantheistico sensu illud admittunt; ita ut nihil iam restet nisi nudum factum et simplex, communibus historiae factis aequandum; hominum nempe sua industria, sollertia, ingenio scholam a Christo eiusque Apostolis inchoatam per subsequentes aetates continuantium. Proinde fidem Patrum firmissime retineo et ad extremum vitae spiritum retinebo, de charismate veritatis certo, quod est, fuit eritque semper in episcopatus ab Apostolis successione; non ut id teneatur quod melius et aptius videri possit secundum suam cuiusque aetatis culturam, sed ut nunquam aliter credatur, nunquam aliter intelligatur absoluta et immutabilis veritas ab initio per Apostolos praedicata.

demnations, declarations, and ordinances contained in the Encyclical letter *Pascendi* and in the Decree *Lamentabili*, particularly regarding what is called the history of Dogma.

"I also reject the error of those who aver that the Faith proposed by the Church may be in conflict with history, and that Catholic dogmas in the sense in which they are now understood cannot be harmonized with the more truthful "origins" of Christianity. Moreover, I condemn and reject the opinion which declares that a Christian man of better culture can assume a dual personality, one as a believer and another as an historian, as if it were permissible for the historian to hold fast what his faith as a believer contradicts, or to lay down premises from which there follows the falsity or the uncertainty of dogmas, provided only that these are not directly denied. Likewise I reject that method of estimating and interpreting Holy Writ, which, setting aside the Church's tradition and the analogy of Faith and the rules of the Apostolic See, adopts the rationalists' principles and with equal arbitrariness and rashness considers criticism of the text the one only supreme rule. Furthermore, I reject the opinion of those who hold that a teacher of the science of Historical Theology or the writer on the subject must first put aside the notions previously conceived about the supernatural origin of Catholic tradition or about the divine aid promised for the perpetual preservation of each revealed truth; then, that the writings of individual Fathers must be interpreted solely by the data of science, without any reference to sacred authority, and with that freedom of judgment wherewith every profane record is usually examined.

"Finally and in general, I declare myself to be far removed from the error of the modernists who hold that in sacred tradition there is nothing inherently divine; or who-far worse still-admit it in a pantheistic sense; so that thus there would remain only a bare simple fact equal to the ordinary facts of history, viz., that the school started by Christ and His Apostles finds, in the ages that follow, men to carry it on by their energy, their skill, and their genius. Wherefore most firmly do I retain and to my last breath will I retain the Faith of the Fathers of the Church concerning the sure endowment of truth, which is, has been, and ever will be in the succession of the Episcopate from the Apostles; not in such a way that what seems best and most fitting according to the refinement of each age may be held, but that the absolute and unchangeable truth preached from the beginning by the Apostles may never in any different wise be believed, never in any

I'm writing in response to your letter of June 17 regarding your health insurance through the Diocese of Winona. I apologize for not getting back to you sooner, but I was on vacation last and just saw your letter this morning.

First, I want to explain to you how the Christian Brothers medical supplement plan works. This policy guarantees you the same level of benefits that you would have had with Christian Brothers if you were not retired and on Medicare. They should have taken your total medical charges, which you indicated were \$1,572.27 and process a claim as if you did not have Medicare. Since I don't have copies of your explanation of benefits, I will assume that they would have first applied your \$100 deductible, bringing the balance down to \$1,472.27. At that point, they would pay 80% of that amount or \$1,177.82. From this amount they would subtract the amount paid by Medicare, which was \$1,004.35, leaving a balance to be paid by Christian Brothers of \$173.47. I do not know why they only paid \$53.94, but I assume there were some items on the bill that were over the usual and customary charge, or perhaps were just not covered expenses. Your explanation of benefits should give you that explanation.

Also, remember that if you have prescription drugs, which you have paid for, and which Medicare does not reimburse, these can be turned into Christian Brothers and they will be paid the same as any other claim. I've found that many people forget about this part of the benefits, so be sure you make those claims.

I appreciate your comments and suggestions that we look into other coverage. While I have talked to others and helped them file claims, no one has suggested at this point that we look into another policy. I would be anxious to hear from some of the other retired priests as to what their situations have been. I will discuss the matter here and let you know what might be done.

Dear Mr. Broadwater,

Of the past few months I have had some medical bills totaling \$1,572.27 from Mayo Clinic, St. Mary's Hospital, Ex-Rays doctors etc. Medicare paid a total of \$1,004.35 Christian Brothers paid ONLY the sum of \$53.94.

I verified the figures with Medicare and then called the C.B.'s and was told that after the 1st \$100.00 deductible I am liable for the next \$1,500.00 "OUT OF POCKET" How that \$53.94 ever got in there I am not sure even after the explanation!!

My doctor tells me my coverage is <u>almost</u> worthless and advises I get another supplementary company like he has with Blue Cross-Blue Shield which pays 100 % after Medicare for a premium of \$800.00 a year. Maybe best I do not have coverage from the diocese. have them pay me and I get my own supplementary coverage. I am thoroughly unhappy with this coverage. Please inform. I dislike bothering you with this matter, but a number of us retired priests have discussed this situation and are anxious for your suggestion and reply.

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

When we discussed Continuing Education assessments a couple of weeks ago I brought up the fact that Fr. Harold Mountain had not paid his assessment for a number of years. The Bishop had asked at that time that he be kept up to date on this type of thing so that he has a full background of the situation.

I received a note from Fr. Mountain today with his payment for health insurance which provides a missing piece to the Continuing Ed assessment puzzle. A number of years ago, Fr. Mountain opted to withdraw from our priests' health insurance plan to purchase coverage of his own, which was apparently cheaper, better coverage or both. In years following that, he tried to get back on the group but Wisconsin Life would not allow it. Fr. Schmitz tried very hard over the years to work this out without success. In 1986 when we switched insurance companies from Wisconsin Life to Travelers, this was a good opportunity to bring Fr. Mountain into the group, which I did. From his letter I received today, I find that he has been withholding Continuing Education assessments to reimburse his parish for the extra money spent on health insurance over the years, obviously blaming the diocese for the problems which he brought upon himself. He is paying the health insurance premium which he would have to do in order to continue to be covered.

It would be my intention at this time to leave the old assessments on the books and deal with it when a new pastor goes to St. Clair. If you would like anything different done, please let me know. Thanks.
